MIGRANTS RESCUED OFF LEFKADA ON GREECE-ITALY SEA ROUTE

Greek rescuers have picked up 29 migrants at sea off the western island of Lefkada as they headed for Italy. It is the first time migrants have been rescued trying to cross from Greece to Italy since Greece's land border with Macedonia was closed in March. The migrants, whose nationalities remain unknown, were found adrift in the Ionian Sea on Sunday.

GLITCH IN BAILOUT TALKS FUELS FEARS OF DELAY IN LOAN DISBURSEMENT

There was fresh concern on Monday that there could be further delays in the disbursement of much-need bailout money to Greece owing to a disagreement between Athens and its creditors, who have demanded changes to prior actions passed in Parliament earlier this month.

European Union officials on Monday appeared to dismiss Greece's refusal to implement some of these changes, saying that these are issues that have already been agreed with the Greek government.

The country's lenders had given the green light for the disbursement of a tranche of 10.3 billion euros last week. on the condition the government made amendments to recent legislation it passed on pension, bad loans and privatizations.

However, Finance Minister Euclid Tsakalotos had informed the European Commission representative and the International Monetary Fund in a letter last week that their demands could not be met. neither could Athens fulfill the demands enshrined in the bailout deal signed last summer to privatize ADMIE, the country's grid operator, and to freeze the wages of essential services, like those of the coast guard and police.

Greece desperately needs the new bailout money to pay state arrears as well as debt repayments to the IMF and ECB in the coming weeks. There were reports on Monday that the government is planning to submit its own amendments on Wednesday to Parliament. If the disagreement between Greece and its creditors persists, then it is likely it will be discussed at the Euro Working Group on Thursday.

Brussels is to call on EU governments not to ban or limit services such as Uber and Airbnb, in a bid to head off a regulatory onslaught from national authorities on the "sharing economy" in Europe. The European Commission will this week set out guidelines to harmonise the often wildly different treatment faced by businesses trying to shake up sectors ranging from accommodation to transport across the 28-country bloc.

Hungary said Monday it had begun reinforcing its anti-migrant fence on the Serbian border after more people started arriving following the evacuation of the Idomeni camp on the Greece-Macedonia frontier. The daily number of illegal entries had risen from 70-90 to 100-150 since Idomeni was evacuated, a government official said.

EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT

• 15:00 **President Schulz** meets **Elhadj As Sy**, Secretary General of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and **Werner Kerschbaum**, Secretary General of the Austrian Federation of Red Cross.

COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN UNION

• 9:30 the Education, Youth, Culture and Sports Council resumes with culture and audiovisual items. The Council is expected to adopt conclusions on the role of Europeana for the digital access, visibility and use of cultural heritage. Subsequently, the Commission will present its proposal for revising the Audiovisual Media Services Directive. Mnisters will then be able to discuss the AVMS proposal in general and address one of the aspects of the AVMS directive in particular, namely the promotion of crossborder circulation of European audiovisual content. Sport-related issues will be dealt with in the afternoon, starting at 14:00. During this session the Council is due to adopt conclusions on enhancing integrity, transparency and good governance in major sport events. It will also include a public debate on the role of governments in improving governance in sport. The sport session will be followed by the 'structured dialogue' meeting between representatives of the sports movement (IOC, EOC, FIFA and UEFA), all EU sport ministers and Commissioner Navracsics. They will address the issue of good governance in relation to major sport events.

• An **informal meeting of agriculture ministers** on the future of the Common Agricultural Policy continues in Amsterdam.

EUROPEAN COMMISSION

• The Commission adopted **new rules on how it selects the advisory expert groups which provide external expertise** to help inform the policy-making process. The Decision provides a single set of rules and principles aimed at increasing transparency, avoiding conflicts of interest and ensuring a balanced representation of interests. The new rules are binding on all Commission departments.
