MASS PROTEST AND COUNTER-MARCH IN WARSAW

POLICE FIRE TEAR GAS AT PROTESTORS OUTSIDE GREEK PARLIAMENT

Greek riot police fired tear gas Sunday to disperse demonstrators who threw Molotov cocktails during an antiausterity protest outside parliament in Athens. Greek television showed police firing volleys of tear gas in response to projectiles lobbed by masked youths during the demonstration, which attracted around 10,000 people angered by the latest measures demanded by Greece's creditors.

GREEK GOVERNMENT TURNS FOCUS TO EUROGROUP AFTER SECURING VOTE ON NEW MEASURES

Greek Finance Minister Euclid Tsakalotos is to face his eurozone counterparts in Brussels today for talks that are expected to focus on the terms of Greece's third bailout and the prospects for debt relief following the approval in Parliament on Sunday night of overhauls of the Greek tax and pension systems.

All 153 coalition lawmakers backed the legislation, which is worth 5.4 billion euros in budget savings.

Despite Greece's keenness to impress creditors with the new laws, no decision is expected at today's meeting.

However, Athens is hoping to secure a positive statement on the outlook for debt relief.

It will also be keen to promote its idea for an automatic mechanism for cutting state spending, basically an alternative for the additional 3.6 billion euros in "contingency" measures the International Monetary Fund wants Greece to legislate now.

Speaking in Parliament before Sunday's vote, Tsipras defended the new measures, noting that the pension reforms leave the majority of main pensions untouched.

Claiming to be undertaking "a massive effort for social justice in conditions of harsh fiscal adjustment," Tsipras accused opposition parties of not having any serious counterproposals to those of the government.

"We are determined to make Greece stand on its two feet at any cost."

EU REFERENDUM: GOVE AND OSBORNE EXCHANGE BLOWS OVER TRADE

Michael Gove has clashed with cabinet colleague George Osborne after he said the UK could pull out of the EU's single market without damaging trade. The justice secretary said the UK would not be "punished" for leaving the EU by having tariffs placed on its exports. But the chancellor said this would be a "catastrophe" in terms of lost jobs and could "wreck the economy". He also warned of a "significant shock" to the housing market.

TURKISH PRESIDENT ERDOGAN REJECTS EU DEMANDS

A day after his prime minister resigned, Turkey's president has spoken out against the EU's demands for changes to terror laws. He also said Turkey urgently needs a new constitution and a presidential system. In a speech broadcast live on television, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan drew particular attention to one of the EU requirements for Turkish citizens to be allowed visa-free travel into the Schengen area. COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN UNION

• 15:00 an extraordinary meeting of the Eurogroup takes place in Brussels to discuss the state of play of the macroeconomic adjustment programme for Greece. Discussions will cover a comprehensive package of policy reforms as well as the sustainability of Greece's public debt.

EUROPEAN COMMISSION

 The Commission presented proposals to reform the Common European Asylum System by creating a more efficient and more sustainable system for allocating asylum applications among Member States. The basic principle will remain the same - asylum seekers should, unless they have family elsewhere, apply for asylum in the first country they enter - but a new mechanism will ensure no Member State is left with a disproportionate pressure on its asylum system. Last week's proposals also include transforming the existing European Asylum Support Office into a fully-fledged European Union Agency for Asylum to reflect its enhanced role in the new system and reinforcing of the EU's fingerprinting database, Eurodac, in order to better manage the asylum system and to help tackle irregular migration.

• The Commission has found the prolongation until 1 October 2016 of an Irish scheme aimed at restructuring credit unions to be in line with EU state aid rules on the restructuring of banks during the crisis.

 The Commission proposed to the Council and the European Parliament to lift the visa requirements for the people of Kosovo by transferring Kosovo to the visa-free list for short-stays in the Schengen area. The proposal is presented together with the Commission's positive assessment confirming that Kosovo has fulfilled the requirements of its visa liberalisation roadmap.

• The Commission published two reports as part of its preparatory work to create a Digital Single Market. The first one is related to the public consultation on the review of the EU Satellite and Cable Directive. The second report covers the public consultation on the technical measures related to the end of roaming charges in the EU.

• Negotiators of the European Parliament, the Council and the Commission agreed on the first EU-wide rules to make the websites and mobile apps of public sector bodies more accessible, especially for the blind, the deaf and the hard of hearing. The Directive will cover public sector bodies' websites and mobile

apps, from administrations, courts and police departments to public hospitals, universities and libraries.

The Commission adopted three major projects: the first, worth €46.6 million from the Cohesion Fund, aims to improve railway connections in Prague, the second, worth €31.5 million from the European Regional Development Fund, will fund the rehabilitation of a national road in the centre of Romania, and the third, worth €201.7 million from the Cohesion Fund, will co-finance the construction of a section of the D3 motorway in the region of Žilina, in Northern Slovakia.
